Bach to the Future

Three musicians from Kent Music came to Meadowfield as part of the Kent Music 'Bach to the Future Roadshow'. Key Stage 2 and 3 pupils spent a very entertaining and enjoyable 45 minutes listening, watching, singing and dancing along to a wide variety of music. They showed us the origins of the instruments using a bucket, straw and tube then played songs and music from films that we knew. We hope they will come back soon.





Kingfishers Class

Kingfishers, we have had a busy few terms. In Science, we have been searching for materials around the school and in the sensory garden. We collected data on how many materials we could find. We have also travelled the school searching for danger as part of our PSHE lessons. We have been learning how to stay safe at school.

Our theme was 'The Lion King' and we made lion masks and lion biscuits. As well as this we have also learnt lots in Literacy and Maths within our 'traditional tales' theme including time and money, and we made the houses for the 3 Little pigs.



This term in Kingfishers, we had a special visit from Oily Cart. We loved playing the instruments and experiencing the sensory story with lots of sensory props. We also had fun completing a sponsored rowathon for charity.

In science we had fun experimenting with magnets. We found out which magnet was strongest and which could hold the most paperclips. In PSHE we have been learning internet safety and how to log onto safe sites.





Robins Class

This term Robins have continued to explore the imaginary world, this time we have looked at traditional and non-traditional tales. The children have been looking at the traditional tale of The Three Little Pigs and the non-traditional tale of The True Story of The Three Little Pigs. We have incorporated this theme into every piece of our curriculum from writing a newspaper article in English to creating our own junk model houses to keep the big bad wolf out in Design and Technology. In scientific enquiry Robins have been looking at materials and their properties, they explored the three little pigs houses to be able to understand which house is the most waterproof and which one absorbed the most water.

This has been a fun packed term where the children have discovered reading for pleasure more than ever. The staff in Robins class would like to wish you a happy Easter and we can't wait to see what adventures we will have with our little team next term.



Robins created designs for Rock your Socks Day where they completed them in Maths to work on their repeating pattern knowledge.




Foxes Class

Over the last couple of terms Foxes class have been learning about castles and they have been reading the book Knights and Dragons Unite. The children have read the story and identified the keywords within the story by matching symbols to symbols and words and symbols to words and symbols or words to words. They have really enjoyed doing this as this has helped improve their reading. After this they have written their beginning and middle of their own Knights and Dragons Story by choosing their own symbols or writing their keyword or even dictating the sentence to the teacher and then copying the sentence on to their work.



We learned all about Spain and we had two Spanish days. The children taste tested different Spanish meat, vegetables, fruit cheese and cereals. Some liked the Spanish tradition and some didn't but they all tried everything and discussed what they liked and disliked and most gave their opinion. All the children learnt numbers, colours and greeting in Spanish. In the morning we did our normal activities like good morning, days of the week, months of the year and how's the weather. They sang these all in English before we then sang them all in Maths. The children have had a fantastic time and really enjoyed themselves.

Another area the children looked at, was a Spanish Artist called Picasso. They looked at his life and his work (paintings) they then created their own painting using crayons before they made Salt Dough faces and painted them in the same style as the artist.



Forest School

Our Forest school sessions have sadly been reduced owing to the pandemic since the beginning of the academic year.

12 Key Stage 4 music and Art students recently had the opportunity to perform at the Woodeville Theatre in Gravesend and the Colyer-Fergusson Hall in Canterbury. The performance was the culmination of months of work for a performance of a story and play written collaboratively with the Big Reveal and some KsENT schools called Living the Dream. Students created a huge puppet of a Demon Queen for the Gravesend performance, which they manipulated during the show. A different group of students prepared a number of instrumental pieces which were used in the show as underscoring or as an accompaniment to the action and story unfolding on stage.

Students showed huge amounts of creativity during the process, and were very resilient when learning to adapt to new situations, unfamiliar places and new people. Well done KS4 Music and Art students, we are very proud of you!

Spending time together to share food is really important to us and we have enjoyed cutting, preparing and eating fruit pancakes during that time. Many of us tried new fruits and also practiced using knives to cut the fruit. Our pancakes were piled high with fruit and they were absolutely delicious!

So, as another term comes to an end, we can't wait for the next one for more fun, learning and of course food!













Caterpillars Class

We have had a lovely time learning and developing our friendships in Caterpillars, this term. We have continued to learn our shapes and numbers and have shared lots of traditional tales. We have also been sharing the book 'We're Going On an Egg Hunt'.

We also went on an egg hunt around the sensory garden. In our EAD lessons, we have explored paint and collage materials. We have also used the boom whackers to explore sound and rhythm when listening to weather songs.

The kiln has continued to be fired regularly with many classes taking part in making pots this term. From pinch pots to coil pots, slab pots to plant pots. Apologies if bags have been coming home heavier than usual and pupils sometimes a little messy! It has been wonderful to teach clay skills and open the kiln to find such beautiful creations. Some of the inventive highlights have been William's bee inspired pot. Naomi's blue girl and the amazing Godzilla made by Reece. Special thanks go to The Arts Society in Faversham who kindly donated £260 towards the art department which enabled us to purchase a clay extruder. It has already been a great time saving device and will make it possible for plant pots to be made in classes across the school next term.

Woodpeckers Class

In Woodpeckers this term we have been really busy learning all about dinosaurs! We listened to 2 different stories; The Dinosaur that Pooped the Bed and Tyrannosaurus Drip. We also started exploring nonfiction and used encyclopaedias to make our own fact files about different dinosaurs.

We have been learning about food and digestion in Science; we even looked at dinosaur poo and identified if the dinosaur was a herbivore, carnivore or an omnivore! In Art we have been making different pieces of art themed around dinosaurs including dinosaur fossils and paper plate dinosaurs.

Music Department

Recently, the Music department were fortunate enough to be awarded a grant from UMUKSF (Universal Music UK Sound Foundation). We used this money to buy a Samba kit!



The 30-piece kit arrived in January and has been printed with the school logo so the troupe will be easily identifiable.

This very exciting purchase will be used to teach students to play in groups, encourage teamwork, collaboration, listening, composing and non-verbal communication skills. Having so many pieces means we will be able to combine classes and work collaboratively when it is safe to do so in the summer term.

We may even be able to do some collaborative work with PE and walking on the playground in procession in the style of a traditional carnival.

This will be trialled with secondary aged students from the subject led department in the first instance but we look forward to being able to roll it out across the school!

Poppies Class

This term in Poppies class we have been learning about fairy tales and our story has been Jack and the Beanstalk. The class have enjoyed engaging with different activities such as making castles from junk modelling and painting a giant beanstalk. We have had some great descriptive sentences describing the characters using adjectives and discussing a day in the life of a giant.

In maths we have been learning about measurement, weight and capacity where we measured beanstalks and even ourselves using foot prints.
