If you have not already done so, please take a few moments to read and respond to the Kent Special School Review: <a href="https://www.kent.gov.uk/specialschoolsreview">www.kent.gov.uk/specialschoolsreview</a>.

Kent County Council (KCC) started to review all Special Schools in Kent in 2022 which has led to a Public Consultation which is now live and closes on 31st July.

I encourage all parents and carers to respond to the four questions detailed within the Public Consultation. Your feedback will help to shape the future provision for all children and young people with Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND) across the county.

I have been working closely with Headteacher colleagues from the Kent Special Educational Needs Trust (KSENT). Together we have been advocating on behalf of all children and young people with SEND to ensure all have access to a high-quality provision leading to excellent outcomes now and in the future.

Unfortunately, school leaders in both special and mainstream schools oppose the proposals put forward in the consultation documents. You may wish to ask yourself

- Are the proposals evidence based?
- Is there enough detail, clarity, openness and transparency in regard to the proposals?
- Are there robust plans in place to support schools to make the necessary changes outlined in the proposals?
- Are the proposals costed with a robust financial analysis?
- How will the change in designation (including SEMH) affect Meadowfield School?

At the start of Term 6, in science, we learnt about the digestive system and made poo to show how the digestive system works.


#### **Nightingale Class**



#### **Starlings Class**

This year, the Starlings class enjoyed having a lot of adventures.

In English, in term one, they met Rick, a dog with differences, and learned that you can have friends no matter who you are or how differently you behave. In term 2, they enjoyed Halloween stories and fireworks with Sparks in the Sky characters. They enjoyed characters from "Christmas Story", finding out why we celebrate Christmas. Term 3 was also exciting, as they joined Pirate Pete looking for treasure on Treasure Island. They found the treasure, but unfortunately, a dragon protected it, and they needed to run. In term 4, they discovered that a greedy man destroyed planet Earth trying to reach a star and beautiful dinosaurs woke up and cleaned the rubbish that man left behind on Earth. In Maths, they learnt to count using manipulatives, play with shapes and explore and match money.

They learnt about rocks, exploring and classifying them. We learnt about animals and insects, their habits, and their food.

PSHE and Preparation for Adulthood prepared them for independent life. They learned about healthy food, keeping their place clean, making friends, behaving around others, sharing and respecting everyone.

In Art, pupils enjoyed painting, working with clay to make coins, boats, and dinosaurs using different techniques and making collages on the painted background.

Starlings had a fantastic year and they look forward to another learning adventure next year.

#### **Wrens Class**

It has been a productive and busy year for all the children in Wrens Class and we have had a lot of fun. Forest School The children have enjoyed visiting the woods with Simon and Chantelle and worked on developing practical skills such as sawing, chopping and making fire. They have learnt how to stay safe in the outside environment, adhering to certain rules. They have created art in the woods using natural materials and enjoyed cooking on an open fire. The children have learnt lots about nature and how to respect our environment.

<u>Christmas performance</u> The children were amazing performing songs, dancing and dressing up for our performance 'Wriggly Nativity' and I know many of you enjoyed the performance.

<u>Preparation for Adulthood</u> The children have all been developing their skills to prepare them for adult life. Skills included personal hygiene routines such as hand washing and brushing teeth. The part of this curriculum area they enjoyed the most was our weekly cooking lesson. The children cooked a variety of different foods using different techniques, learning how to use equipment carefully and to stay safe in the kitchen environment. Some of our best cookery lessons were making a Chinese stir fry and pizzas which we delivered back to class on our own 'Uber' delivery vehicle.

<u>School Trips and Visits</u> We enjoyed our trips to Rochester Cathedral and Wild Wood, and the whole of term 6 our weekly visit to Faversham pool where we had lots of fun in the pool with Deanna.

Wrens Class had an amazing year and all the children made fantastic progress and had a lot of fun. We hope you all have a great summer.

























#### **Fawns Class**

Fawns have had a great year! We have really improved our independence in PE lessons and are now getting changed for PE and redressed afterwards. The children have engaged in special days over the year, including World Book Day.

What has been paramount over the year is their enthusiasm to engage in out of class activities, which have included, soft play at Sittingbourne, Forest School and three school trips. We've had a busy and exciting year here in Glennie. The Christmas elf visited us in the run up to Christmas and was really naughty! We had fun seeing what he got up to in the night when no one was here.

We have learnt a lot since September. We have studied some audio-visual texts and have recently enjoyed reading Michael the Amazing Mind Reading Sausage Dog in class.

We have explored lots of money problems, and even set up our own Glennie shop, complete with till and conveyor belt! In Science we've investigated everything from Space and Stars to the Human Body. We've planted and grown sunflowers too.

#### **Atlantis and Phoenix Classes Pop up cafe**

For our enterprise project, we decided to open a pop-up cafe at 6th Form. The students spent this term learning about cafes! They visited a cafe to see how it was run, achieved their Cafe Hygiene certificate, learnt how to make hot drinks and different foods and carried out a lot of taste testing. It was exciting to see the students go around 6th Form, sharing the cakes and toasties that they had made and hearing how nice they were!

Leading up to our opening day, the students had to prepare by deciding what they wanted to sell, creating the menus and baking the cakes. On the day, they took orders from the parents, helped to make the toasties, sandwiches and drinks. All of the students had a chance to try different jobs, developing their independence and life skills. It was a great success and we are all proud of the students. The cafe raised over £130 for the Royal Marsden Cancer Charity.

#### **Poppies Class**

Poppies have had a wonderful year! They have been making fabulous progress and showing kindness and empathy towards others.

We have embarked on two school trips; Wildwood and Rochester. The pupils have shown that they are able to follow instructions, listen to adults and be safe within the community.

We have enjoyed learning how to use different equipment and cooking utensils in our cooking lessons as well as trying new foods. We have also enjoyed Forest School and Swimming, again showing our ability to stay safe and follow instructions. What an amazing year we have had in Poppies class!









#### **Enterprise Class**

Enterprise completed work experience within Milton Creek, a country park. This offered students a unique opportunity to gain practical skills while engaging with nature. This immersive experience allows students to participate in a variety of tasks, from conservation and wildlife managements to park maintenance and visitor services. The students worked alongside Kris, a park ranger. This hands-on learning environment not only enhances students understanding of our environment but also supports a deeper appreciation for nature.

Additionally, the experience helps develop teamwork, communication and problem-solving skills all working towards adulthood, providing a well-rounded foundation for future careers. The students really enjoyed this opportunity.









#### **Honey Bees**

Honey Bees have had a wonderful year! We have had 53 pupils come through our Specialist Intervention Nursery this academic year, where we have supported these children both onsite at Honey Bees Nursery and at their mainstream nursery settings. Over the year we have introduced different communication strategies to many of our pupils and mainstream settings and have seen incredible progress by doing so! We have enjoyed aqua splash in the hyrdopool with Diamonds class, joined PE lessons with the support of Snowdrops pupils and developed a love for imaginative play in our imaginative autism pod. We are so proud of all 53 pupils who have attended Honey Bees this year and wish them all the very best with their onwards journey to school!











#### **Badgers Class**

This year has been a magnificent one for Badgers. The children have gelled very well and we have seen our children make great strides in communication, emotional regulation and wellbeing. Academically there have been many highlights, such as using shells from the beach to find fractions of quantities (see picture). Other highlights include a successful trip to the park, progress in swimming using the hydropool and Easter cake decorating.

Most recently, in preparation for adulthood, we prepared our own kebab using Rainforest fruit, which involved all pupils successfully using sharp and pointy tools before enjoying a delicious, healthy snack.

#### **Snowdrops Class**

Snowdrops showcased their cricket skills this year, when taking part in a masterclass skills day at Swallows Leisure Centre, representing their school. They have keen memories of this exciting day and have been able to recall some essential skills learned, during their PE lessons and practise during playtimes. Having opportunities like these allowed the class to engage in a new sport and experience mixing with children from different schools.

Over the year, all of Snowdrops have shown a keen interest in their Art, whether this has been, retelling a story through drama activities, using a range of media to create beautiful, unique pieces of physical art, or taking part in various singing and music days including 'Sing-up'. All of these creative elements have enabled them to express their individual creativity.

Their trips this year took them to the ruins of Old Rochester Castle, exploring the grounds and gazing at the vast structure of local history. Then, over the rope bridge above the ferocious Wildwood bears was definitely a trip to remember. They were not that scary, so the children say. Maybe it is the staff that were scared! They had a wonderful time learning about different animals, reptiles, amphibians and birds. In term 5 they got to investigate bugs in science and use magnifiers to see these creatures in detail.

During their science day, Snowdrops had fishing fun, with static fishing using balloons and tissue paper fish. Although there were some rather strange hairstyles after charging the balloons on their heads. They also explored how water can move objects.

Finishing term 6 with a fun art week, taking part in listening to and trying out different instruments, traditional and modern story dance, and creating their own costumes. As well as a chance to explore a fire engine up close.













#### **Atlantis Class**

We have been out and about in the local community a lot this year in Atlantis Class. The students have had different opportunities to visit a range of different places. 














#### **Phonics Highlight of the Year**

This legislation has changed register codes including the removal of authorised holidays, the reporting to the Local Authority absences of more than 15 days including for illness and changes to the requirements for schools to advise the Local Authority of unauthorised absences and Penalty Notices.

We will be analysing the legislation over the summer holiday and will update our Attendance Policy, Statement and guidance to parents/carers in September to reflect these legal legislation changes. Although some of the changes will be unwelcome to parents/carers, please remember they are Department of Education and legal changes that the school must follow and not changes that the school as implemented.
