Soft landing example

Using visuals provides a concrete reference and predictability for the pupil. They don't have a tone of voice or body language to interpret and therefore provide a consistent message to the pupil. Step Visual If possible, have consistency in the person who 1. greets the child, if this differs from day to day, ensure the child knows who will meet them the day before, a visual will help. Arrive at Meet the child with the activity they had planned to school complete as a prompt. "We focus on relationships because they shape who we are and are key to our development as human beings." solihullapproachparenting.com Transition straight to an alternative environment if 2. one is being used rather than applying demands of following arrival routines in the classroom. Family Room Providing a snack and a drink is 3. meeting the child's physiological needs (links to Snack and Maslow's Hierarchy of Need). It drink shares the message that you care. The adult can partake in a snack and drink also. Ask the child to choose the activity they wish to 4. complete before they leave the day before. This will provide predictability for them in the morning. Staff may wish to create a choice board of appropriate Activity activities they are happy to offer. An emotional check in allows both the child and 5. adult to identify how they are feeling, linking to containment and reciprocity in the Solihull Approach Colour Model. The timetable and check in can be Monster **Timetable** completed together. Please see STLS check in, Check In check-up, check out resource. If not completed at step 5, go through the timetable 6. for the day so the child has a clear understanding of what is ahead. This is appropriate even when there is a whole class visual timetable in place. Timetable 7. Transition back into the classroom, key adult who has completed the soft landing to settle child or remain with child for at least 5 minutes if there is a change of support. Classroom
